Internship position: Immersion in the concept of Quality of Life

Organization/unit/research project: E-QUAL

E-QUAL is a center of expertise on Quality of Life, situated within the Faculty of Education, Health and Social Work of the University College Ghent. Over the years, the concept of Quality of Life (QoL) has been applied in different contexts and has shown to be a useful theoretical framework for supporting people in divergent socially vulnerable situations (e.g. persons with intellectual disabilities, persons with substance-related problems or other chronic diseases). Instead of treating a disease or disorder, supporting persons to pursue personal goals in life, and by doing so improving their QoL, is considered as one of the most important objectives and outcome indicators of today's practices in health, special education and other fields. E-QUAL focuses on generating, developing and disseminating theoretical knowledge and practical applications related to the concept of Quality of Life starting from a cross- and interdisciplinary perspective. Central research topics are: community-based support, recovery, quality of life, peer work, assessment, mental health and addiction, human rights, etc.

Description of position:

- This position will provide opportunities to strengthen your research capacities and global
 engagement in the context of an applied international and interdisciplinary research project.
 The student(s) will be supervised by one lecturer/researcher but exchange frequently with the
 entire research team as well as organizations in the field. Moreover, the research project is
 embedded within the Centre of Expertise on Quality of Life (E-QUAL), which will also offer plenty
 of opportunities for learning on related topics.
- Possible responsibilities may include:
 - Carrying out literature reviews: e.g. on evidence-based interventions that support
 Quality of Life of people living in vulnerable situations (disabilities, mental health,
 children, addiction, etc.)
 - Support in the development of instruments to measure QoL in vulnerable situations
 - Support the valorization of a current practice-based research project on peer work.
 Examples of "valorization" include: setting up an art exposition, photo book, video, developing a workshop, etc.
 - Writing project proposals: e.g. on the topic of Quality of Life to investigate QoL in the general population in Belgium and to develop indicators at policy level to do so.

- o Further develop an attractive website for the center and PR methods (e.g. app)
- Develop training materials on the implementation of Quality of Life by use of innovative methods
- Being involved as a team member in a practice-based research project "Community development through participatory action research: towards interventions that facilitate living with HIV/AIDS in the (school) community in Uganda" - possible tasks: literature review on stigma, data analysis (qualitative interviews).
- Data analysis on subjective wellbeing of children + develop valorization methods
- Setting up a knowledge library on evidence-based interventions to improve QoL
- o Practical support in the organization of a summer school and/or conference
- Presenting own research and getting feedback
- Sharing research skills (both qualitative and quantitative)
- The research intern can expect to develop/learn the following:
 - Strong teamwork
 - Data analysis
 - Critical insights in research methodologies
 - Presentation skills
 - Working in an interdisciplinary team

Preferred qualifications:

UVA requirement: All candidates must be in good academic and disciplinary standing.

- Given the interdisciplinary nature of E-QUAL and the concept of QoL, students from different schools and programmes in health, education, humanities, and social sciences are welcomed.
- Given that experience with academic research is required, we prefer advanced undergraduate or graduate students.
- Other relevant qualifications/qualities include (among other things): knowledge of
 interpretative research methodologies, excellent writing skills, communication skills, ability to
 analyse critically, ability to think innovatively and design-oriented, planning and time
 management, independent worker and team player.

Language:

 Dutch is the language of the workplace but English is spoken and widely understood by E-QUAL staff. Selected students will be offered the opportunity to commence self-study of Dutch prior to their arrival in Belgium (during the Spring 2020) semester, as having even a basic knowledge of the language would be beneficial for daily life in Ghent.

 Working hours: M-F, likely 9am-5pm with lunch break but can be discussed with supervisor at beginning of internship period
